Passive Consumption: Simply listening or reading without actively processing the language can slow progress. Learners should engage with the material by taking notes, summarizing, or asking questions to reinforce their understanding. Language output, which refers to speaking and writing, is an essential complement to input. Active use of the language allows learners to practice forming sentences, using new vocabulary, and refining their pronunciation. Output plays a key role in solidifying language knowledge and developing fluency. **Start Speaking Early:** Many learners delay speaking in the second language out of fear of making mistakes. However, early practice in speaking is crucial for building confidence and fluency. Even at the beginner level, learners should try to converse in the language as much as possible.
