In this role, the EP approves the EU's annual budget, meticulously reviewing spending priorities and ensuring that funds are allocated in a manner that reflects the EU's policy objectives. Moreover, the EP monitors the implementation of the budget, holding EU institutions accountable for the responsible and transparent use of public resources.

The physical operations of the European Parliament are distributed across three distinct locations: Strasbourg, Brussels, and Luxembourg. In a symbolic move underscoring the EP's commitment to freedom of expression and human rights, one of the halls within the Parliament's press center bears the name of Anna Politkovskaya, a Russian journalist and human rights activist who was murdered for her investigative reporting. This dedication serves as a reminder to advocate for human rights.
