The article explores various instructional approaches, including process-based, genre-based, product, and hybrid models, alongside pre-, during-, and post-writing strategies like brainstorming, peer review, and collaborative writing. Additionally, it discusses task-based, content-based, and technology-enhanced methods, underlining their role in building fluency, organization, and confidence. The conclusion reinforces the need for consistent practice and feedback, offering potential research questions for further exploration into the effectiveness of these teaching practices.*

Introduction

Writing is a complex skill that requires a multifaceted approach to instruction. For English as a Foreign Language (EFL) students, the challenges are often compounded by linguistic, cultural, and cognitive factors. This paper explores effective writing strategies and methods that can help EFL students to improve their writing skills.

Literature review

Writing has consistently been recognized as a critical skill in English language acquisition. This significance arises from its role in reinforcing the grammatical structures and vocabulary that educators aim to instill in their students. Writing is an area where learners require sufficient time to develop their skills; therefore, increased classroom time should be allocated to writing practice, especially for English language learners (ELLs), to prepare them for effective communication in both real-world and academic contexts. Engaging students in the writing process through diverse activities is an effective approach to achieving this objective. Furthermore, writing skills are enhanced when learners' interests are considered and when they are frequently provided with opportunities to practice writing. Since one of the primary goals of ESL learners is to produce well-organized written work, a structured writing program is essential to address their specific needs. A thorough review of the literature reveals that numerous researchers have emphasized the importance of exposing ESL students to a variety of genres, strategies, and methods to support their success in English writing (Yulianti, D. B. 2018).

Writing is a vital skill as it serves as a primary means of communication and self-expression. It is applied in everyday tasks such as note-taking, as well as in more complex contexts, such as completing forms and academic writing. Yulianti argued that writing fosters critical thinking by enabling students to articulate and organize their ideas in a structured manner. Among the four core language skills taught in schools, students typically consider writing the most challenging. The process of composition can be intimidating for students, especially those lacking confidence in English. Stalin and Kim Hua(2020) described writing as the most demanding skill for English as a Second Language (ESL) learners to master. Theresia (2017) also noted that many students find writing both difficult and stressful. Misbah et al. (2017) suggested that the inability to effectively convey their thoughts can demotivate students, reducing their use of English in daily life. Moreover, students often view English as a tedious subject, largely due to difficulties in understanding the intricacies

of writing. Yunus and Chien (2016) observed that students frequently appear anxious and hesitant when writing, leading to disorganized ideas. They further highlighted that, although students may have ideas, they often struggle to express them cohesively with proper diction and language. Despite learning English from a young age, many students still find it challenging to produce grammatically correct, well-organized essays. Pazilah et al. (2019) emphasized that mastering writing is crucial for students as it is required for Malaysian examinations. Therefore, this systematic review will explore the strategies used in ESL classrooms to teach writing and examine their impact on ESL learners.(M. Lavanya, 2022)

Effective Writing Strategies

There are number of strategies in teaching writing, the most common strategy is process approach. The process approach to writing emphasizes achieving a final product by following a series of steps. Over time, various scholars have developed and refined models to guide this writing process. Kallestinova (2017) identified three main stages: pre-writing, editing, and revising. According to Donovan and McClelland(1980), the process approach cannot be fully understood from an endpoint perspective; rather, it requires a progression through drafting stages. They further explained that this approach includes dedicated phases for drafting and revising. This aligns with findings in the literature. Studies by Qomariyah and Permana(2016) and Chandran et al.(2019) suggest that using a process-based approach can foster creativity in students as they develop paragraphs, ultimately enhancing their writing experience.

Another common approach is genre-based approach. Martin(1990) argues that genre-based approaches motivate students and foster continuous learning. This cyclical approach enables students to engage with, comprehend, and critically analyze authentic texts. Teachers and students can collaboratively interpret these texts, aligning with the findings of recent studies. Choi & Wong (2018) and Stalin & Kim Hua further support the use of genre pedagogy to structure learning and encourage creative expression.

The product approach, another strategy for language learning, emphasizes the final written output. Tangpermpoon (2008) suggests that this approach strengthens grammar and syntax in second language writing, and also enhances language awareness through model paragraphs, sentence combining, and rhetorical pattern exercises. Palanisamy & Aziz (2021) further support this idea, highlighting that the

primary focus of this approach is the quality of the final product, including factors such as readability, grammar, and the clarity of main ideas and supporting details.

Finally, the hybrid approach which is the combination of two approaches. There were two hybrid approaches found: process-genre approach (Sapurta 2015) and process-product approach (Yuk A,C,K 2021)

1. Pre-writing Strategies:

- **Brainstorming:** Encourage students to generate ideas freely through techniques like mind mapping or listing.
- **Outlining:** Help students organize their thoughts into a logical structure.
- **Freewriting:** Promote fluency by writing continuously without worrying about grammar or spelling.

2. Writing Strategies:

- **Timed Writing:** Practice writing under time constraints to improve fluency and time management.
- **Process Writing:** Guide students through the writing process, emphasizing planning, drafting, revising, editing, and proofreading.
- **Journal Writing:** Encourage regular writing practice to develop fluency and self-expression.
- **Collaborative Writing:** Facilitate peer collaboration to exchange ideas, provide feedback, and improve writing quality.

3. Post-writing Strategies:

- **Peer Review:** Have students exchange and provide feedback on each other's writing.
- **Self-assessment:** Encourage students to evaluate their own writing and identify areas for improvement.
- **Teacher Feedback:** Provide specific, constructive feedback to help students improve their writing.
- **Portfolio Assessment:** Collect and evaluate students' writing over time to track their progress.

Effective Writing Methods

In addition to strategies, effective writing methods can enhance EFL students' writing skills:

1. **Task-Based Learning:** Engage students in authentic writing tasks that simulate real-world situations.

2. **Content-Based Instruction:** Integrate writing into content-area instruction to provide context and relevance.
3. **Technology-Enhanced Learning:** Utilize technology tools, such as word processors, grammar checkers, and online writing platforms, to support writing development.
4. **Error Correction:** Provide targeted feedback on errors to help students improve their accuracy.
5. **Reading Extensively:** Encourage students to read widely to expand their vocabulary, improve their grammar, and develop their writing style.

Conclusion

By incorporating a combination of effective strategies and methods, EFL teachers can create a supportive and stimulating learning environment that fosters the development of students' writing skills. It is important to remember that writing is a gradual process, and continuous practice and feedback are essential for improvement. By providing opportunities for regular writing, constructive feedback, and authentic language use, teachers can empower EFL students to become confident and skilled writers.
